Cyril DeGrasse Tyson is the former Project Director of Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited, the juvenile delinquency study which produced the document Youth in the Ghetto: The Consequences of Powerlessness and a Blueprint for Change. He was also Executive Director of HARYOU-ACT, NY; Chief of the Business and Employment Division, Commission on Human Rights, NY; Executive Director of the United Community Corporation, Newark, NJ; Deputy Administrator of the Human Resources Administration and Commissioner of its Manpower and Career Development Agency in New York; Vice President of Optimum Computer Systems; Vice President of The City College of New York; and Assistant Director of the Port Authority of NY and NJ.

Mr. Tyson has a B.A. from St. Francis College, Brooklyn, NY., and an M.A. from Columbia University. He was a Teaching Fellow at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, and a Research Associate at the Program on Technology and Society, Harvard University. He is also co-editor of *Technological Development in Nigeria*, published in 1979.
